Happy 100th Birthday to a living Habitat legend

n Oct. 1, 39th United States President James Earl "Jimmy" Carter celebrated his 100th birthday. Although he is not the founder of Habitat for Humanity, as many believe, he is often viewed as a champion for the nonprofit organization and its fight for affordable housing.

These days, President
Carter is not active on build
sites, but the namesake
program "Carter Work
Projects" established by him
and his former wife Rosalynn
lives on. In its 40 years, more
than 106,100 volunteers have

Mason said he was first introduced to Habitat a few years ago at its Fall Feastival

fundraiser. Since then, he volunteered at different events and projects within the community. As a board member, he wants to contribute to the mission.

"I feel as an insurance agent, who offers home, auto, and commercial insurance, my mission connects with GSHFH in a sense where we're building community," Mason said. "I want to bring a mixture of my knowledge and involvement in the community that Habitat serves."

Greater Springfield Habitat Board President Ray Walsh asked Mason if he would like to join the board.

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"Mason brings strong business acumen and his background in sales and marketing, which will help us further drive awareness and contributions to our organization," said Ray. "In his professional life, he is committed to serving the local community and is eager to give back and support those in need."

participated in 14 countries and built 4,417 Habitat homes in quick-turnaround construction projects.

Among those volunteers is Greater Springfield Habitat for Humanity (GSHFH) Executive Director Aimee Giroux. In 2017, she said she ventured to Edmonton, Canada, with two colleagues to participate in the weeklong project. Aimee and her team worked on flooring and interior finish work in multiple units in a mixed-income condominium complex. Additional build sites were in Winnipeg. In total, this effort helped 247 families.

"President and Mrs. Carter were great," Aimee said.
"He spoke and he was very charismatic. They worked together and he was very sweet. He still held the door open for her and held her hand, and he was really into being out there."

In 1984, three years after President Carter, and his wife Rosalynn, left the White House, the pair ventured to Americus, in their home state of Georgia, to work with Habitat for Humanity. The couple quickly realized Habitat's mission aligned closely with their own values and soon developed a strong relationship with the nonprofit to combat the affordable housing crisis.

"Habitat successfully removed the stigma of charity by substituting it with a sense of partnership," President Carter once said.

The first "Carter Work
Project" was in September
1984 in New York City's Lower
East Side to renovate a sixstory abandoned building for
affordable housing. The Carters
led dozens of volunteers to work
alongside 19 families.

"I think their involvement has made a significant contribution and raised Habitat's visibility to greater heights than Habitat could have done on its own," said Tina Mancuso, Greater Springfield Habitat supporter. "They were dedicated to making a difference and they truly did."

Trina Winans, GSHFH volunteer and supporter, agreed.

"President and Mrs. Carter are a powerful example of how individuals can make a significant difference," she said. "Their involvement in Habitat shows a deep commitment and genuine care for others. It highlights their integrity, dedication to service, and the value they play on follow-through and long-term involvement in causes they believe in."

Even though the Carters no longer participate in the work projects, Habitat for Humanity International continues them in honor of the Carters. This year's event took place in St. Paul, Minnesota, between Sept. 29 and Oct. 1. Habitat humanitarians and country music superstars Garth Brooks and Trisha Yearwood hosted the event.
